REFLECTIONS

"Calling them like ${\cal D}$ see them"

Perhaps like me, you were struck by the amount of prayer needs we had this past Sunday. They ranged from all over the spectrum. Someone with an illness, someone with some bruising, someone undergoing a procedure, someone beloved passing beyond the veil, and some communities deeply affected by the hurricane. There's a lot going on all at once. A lot of people hurting.

It's natural to want to do something. We remember the reactions to previous storms and disasters and the ways people sort of rush to want to give aid, right? Puerto Rico, Haiti, New Orleans. Something happens, and people, moved by the tragedy they see and hear, want to do something to help those in need. It's natural. It's a good thing, a mark of humanity that makes us believe that we are made in the image of a loving and compassionate God.

In the weeks to come, the Missions Team is going to formulate a church-level response to the aftermath of the hurricane that left so much devastation in its wake. If you're feeling called and moved by the Spirit to do something *right now* about it as an individual, you may consider giving to our partners who do that kind of thing: FBC in Erwin, TN or the Global CBF Disaster Response.

Before you give to that worthy cause, allow me to draw our attention to the other needs. There are folks in our fellowship who are in the hospital, and a visit might make them feel more love and less isolation. There are members of our church family in deep mourning and pain, and cup of coffee with someone who cares might be a valuable thing. There are long-time saints of the fellowship who may feel alone and forgotten who would love to host you for an hour to chat about a bunch of nothing in particular and it would make their week!

If you're feeling moved by the tragedy of our neighbors, then it's a sign of God's goodness within you, my friend. I only ask that we all remember that there are other tragedies, other needs, that will never make the national news but are no less real. Give, donate, go, volunteer. Do everything that God is leading you to do. But consider if God is also calling you to do something about those other needs that won't have a headline.

Before reading the rest of the hymn below, lay this carpet of thought on your reading room floor: creation is a constant reminder that God is ultimately in charge. The list of natural things and events in the hymn are summarized in this assertion: "O let me never forget that though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the ruler yet." Nature is beautiful. It is powerful and amazing and many things. And perhaps one of them is that we have a constant, continual reminder that God is the ruler. Even in the year of a federal election, God is the Ruler yet.

This is my Father's world, And to my listening ears All nature sings, and round me rings The music of the spheres. This is my Father's world: I rest me in the thought Of rocks and trees, of skies and seas-- His hand the wonders wrought.
