REFLECTIONS

"Calling them like ${\cal D}$ see them"

Starting this Wednesday (Oct. 16), we're going to use our Bible Study time to consider the dangers of Christian Nationalism. If that sounds familiar to you, it might be because I gave a plug to an event in Knoxville last month that featured a lecturer who is an expert on that subject. Many of you attended that lecture. I did too and I was really looking forward to it. Unfortunately, I don't feel like it was a very helpful lecture for those who hadn't encountered the topic before. It was just too heady, a bit too stuck in the clouds to be of any use to anyone who still bothers to walk with their own two feet!

Just to give an idea of the event, the host of the event asked the lecturer after several hours of lecturing to give a simple working definition of what Christian Nationalism means. Do you know what that means?! It means that after hours of lecturing, the guy never gave a clear picture of the broadest topic that he was there to be an expert on. Not for nothing, but he didn't spit on out even after that! (I could say more about my frustrations, but let me stop there).

And if you, like the people at that lecture, might be wondering what Christian Nationalism is, I'll end with that definition:

Christian nationalism is a cultural framework that idealizes and advocates a fusion of Christianity with American civic life.

Christian nationalism contends that America has been and should always be distinctively "Christian" from top to bottom – in its self-identity, interpretations of its own history, sacred symbols, cherished values, and public policies – and it aims to keep it that way.

But the "Christian" in Christian nationalism is more about identity than religion. It carries with it assumptions about nativism, white supremacy, authoritarianism, patriarchy, and militarism.

I'm devoting the next 3 Wednesday night Bible studies to the topic because it's worth talking about and understanding. Christian Nationalism isn't some ideological playground for scholars to frolic in; it's a real danger to a functioning democracy and especially for those of us who treasure what it means to be Baptist. (I'll be dedicating my next articles to that subject, so keep reading). If you haven't tried Wednesday night Bible study, or haven't been in a while, maybe give this short series a try. We meet at 6pm in the Fellowship Hall and someone usually brings something to snack on. I hope to see you there.

Transport yourself by imagination to the 1st century streets of Jerusalem. Picture Roman soldiers wearing armor and carrying swords. The citizenry is in long dress-like garments. Sandals. Dirt streets. No such thing as a car. Everyone's on foot. The streets are lined with people watching as Jesus is paraded by laboring exhaustedly under the weight of a huge wooden cross. Sweating.

He stumbles. You involuntarily lunge to help him. If compassion is within you. If you see Jesus' innocence and the undeserved cruelty imposed on him, you have a natural and compelling answer to this hymn's question: "No, there's a cross for everyone, and there's a cross for me."

Jesus told those around him, especially his closest followers, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." The emphasis in that statement at that time to those people was on the suffering. "Life with me will be costly, unpleasant at times, even painful." But, the ultimate reality of a true self-denying cross-carrying life is abundant life; eternal life.

"How happy are the saints above who once went sorrowing here! But now they taste unmingled love and joy without a tear."
